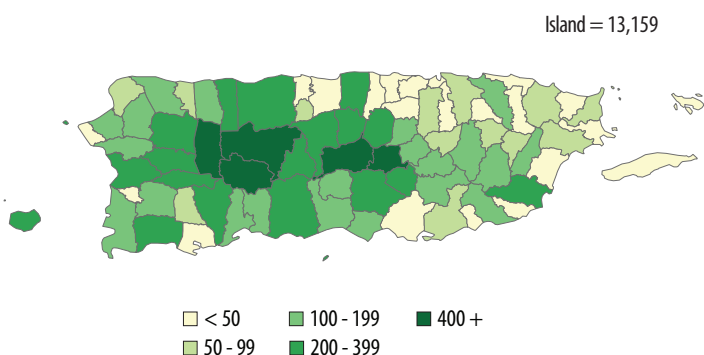

Puerto Rico had 13,159 farms in 2012, occupying a total of 584,988 cuerdas. This was a 16 percent decrease in the number of farms, and a 5 percent increase in farmland, since 2007. During the same time, sales of agricultural products increased 6 percent. The concentration of farms was higher on the western side of the island than the eastern, and five municipios had 400 or more farms in 2012 (Fig.1).

These are among the many findings in the 2012 Census of Agriculture. Conducted every five years and scheduled again for 2017, the census collects data on the number of farms, commodities produced, level of sales, production practices, producer demographics, and much more.

Farmland

Eighty-three percent of farms in Puerto Rico had fewer than 50 cuerdas in land in 2012, including 39 percent that had fewer than 10 cuerdas. Seventeen percent of farms had 50 or more cuerdas. (Table 1) Cropland accounted for 74 percent of farmland, of which more than half was used for pasture or grazing. The remaining 26 percent of farmland was used for pasture and rangeland, woodland, house lots, buildings, ponds, roads, and wasteland.

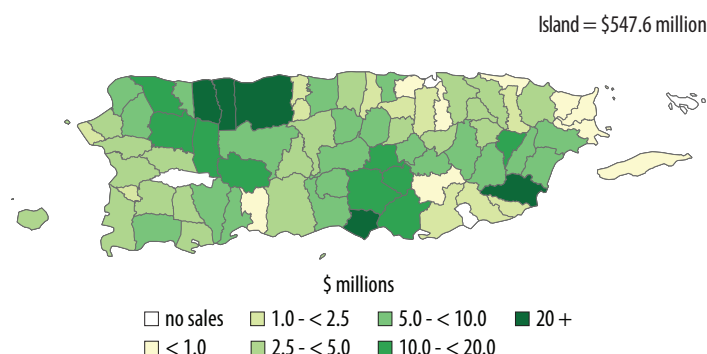

Farm Sales

Puerto Rico's total agricultural sales in 2012 amounted to \$547.6 million, up from \$515.7 million in 2007 but lower than the value of sales in 2002 (\$581.5 million). The municipio of Arecibo had the highest level of agricultural sales, valued at \$44.8 million. Five municipios had agricultural sales of more than \$20 million in 2012. (Fig. 2)

Per farm average sales in 2012 were \$41,616 (compared with \$32,752 in 2007). But only 13 percent of farms had agricultural product sales of \$40,000 or more. More than half of farms (53 percent) had sales of less than \$5,000, including 23 percent of farms that sold less than \$1,000 in agricultural products for the year. (Table 2)

Producer Characteristics

The census collected demographic information on each farm's principal operator, defined as the person responsible for the day-to-day operation of the farm.

Of the 13,159 principal operators, 92 percent were male, 58 percent considered something other than farming to be their primary occupation, and more than half (57 percent) had received a high school diploma, GED certificate, or higher. Principal operators' average age was 59 years, and for 58 percent of farmers, farming contributed less than 25 percent of their total income. (Table 3)
